Welcome to the traditional territory of the Klahoose Nation, a vast and beautiful landscape reaching from the turquoise waters of Yekwamen (Toba Inlet) to the northern islands of the Salish Sea. Our resort is situated in the heart of these ancestral lands, within *Thee chum mi yich* (Homfray Channel), meaning further back inside, in close proximity to our sister Nations: the Homalco, Kwakiutl, and Tla'amin. While you visit us here in the territory, our permanent community continues to thrive at Squirrel Cove on Cortes Island.

TRADITIONAL WELCOME

Since time immemorial, we have used formal protocols to acknowledge the spirit in everything around us—the water, the plant life, the animals, and our ancestors. Our people have always known that everything in nature is interconnected; nothing exists in isolation, and every living thing depends on the other. We welcome you to experience this harmony during your stay.



Authentic Indigenous experiences, as defined by Indigenous Tourism BC, are those that are owned or led by Indigenous people and grounded in genuine culture, history, and connection to the land. They matter because they support community self-determination, preserve living traditions, and offer visitors a deeper, more meaningful way to experience a place.

OUR GUEST

So, what exactly is a traditional Klahoose welcome? As toq qaymɪx^w (Klahoose) People, who come from the coastal regions, our traditional way of getting around is by canoe or boat. When we travel to new lands, we introduce ourselves, openly state our intentions, and ask permission to come ashore. And when we are the host, our job is to protect our community, our lands, nature, and as human beings, show a deep respect.

When you arrive at Klahoose Wilderness Resort you are guests and are invited to come ashore. Once you have this invitation, we treat each guest with warmth and kindness, making sure they're well-fed and taken care of. We let them know what's expected during their stay. In this case we remind you that all stories, images, place names and language are more than just content and information, they're incredibly valuable to our people, either belonging to the cultural interpreter and their community of the toq qaymɪx^w community. As our guests, we invite you to take a moment and think about why you are visiting the Klahoose territory and show a willingness to respect the sacred principles of the traditional welcome, and toq qaymɪx^w protocol.

BEFORE YOU LEAVE HOME

MANDATORY GUEST INFORMATION

Please ensure that you have provided us with the most up to date contact information including your in-travel contact information, your Arrival and Departure details and special dietary needs to info@klahooseresort.com.

DIETARY

Your stay includes all meals starting with dinner on the day of arrival to breakfast on the day of departure.

Meals served are a set menu and while we can cater to most specialty diets and requirements, we must be notified at least 45 days in advance of your stay. As a remote lodge, only accessible by boat and seaplane, we will have limited availability to customize your meal while you are staying with us.

If you have not already done so, please advise us of any dietary requirements or allergies that we should be aware of.

Your stay is inclusive of meals, snacks, and up to two complimentary glasses of house wine or beer with each dinner.

Your room has a fridge so feel free to bring your own extra snacks or beverages for your room.

WAIVER

Because of the nature of the activities in which our guests commonly participate in, all guests are required to sign a Guest Participant Release which is available in your guest details link or when you arrive at the resort. Minors must have a parent or legal guardian sign the waiver on their behalf. A copy of the waiver can be available to you upon written request to Klahoose Wilderness Resort.



PRE-TRIP

ARRIVAL

Please meet us in front of the main lobby entrance of The Lund Resort at Klah ah men (Lund) at 2:30 pm with your luggage. Klah ah men means a place to head towards, a place of refuge, and is where your journey into Klahoose territory begins. We will assist you with your bags and escort you to the marina dock and our boat.

Our boat departs from the Lund Marina, located beside the Lund Resort, at 3:00 pm.

Powell River is about a 1 hour drive from Lund along the scenic Sunshine Coast Highway. Lund is at the end of the road, Highway 101, where Desolation Sound begins—a perfect place to start your adventure!

POWELL RIVER AIRPORT TRANSFERS

Pre-arranged road transfers between Powell River Airport (YPW) and Lund are available and complimentary when booked in advance. The road transfer takes about one hour. Transfers are timed to meet Pacific Coastal Airlines flights arriving in Powell River (YPW) between 10:30 am and 12:30 pm, depending on the seasonal schedule.

Guests will be returned to Lund Harbour between 11:00 am and 12:00 pm. From Lund, the road transfer back to Powell River Airport takes about one hour, meeting afternoon flights, again depending on the seasonal schedule.

Flights between Vancouver Airport and Powell River Airport are subject to change. Please check with us before making flight arrangements.

Note: We can also arrange pick-ups or drop-offs from your Powell River hotel or Harbour Air flights on this same transfer schedule.

All transfers between Powell River and Lund are included when reserved in advance.

LUND PARKING

Parking is available in Lund. At the Lund Marina, adjacent to the Lund Resort, parking can be paid locally for about \$12 per day (subject to change) in the marina meters.

Our collective commitment to sustainable tourism and stewardship helps ensure these lands, waters, wildlife, and cultural traditions remain strong for our people, visitors, and future generations.

Reconciliation Through Travel

Travel can create opportunities for understanding, connection, and meaningful cultural exchange. Through respectful experiences and shared learning, we hope guests leave with a deeper appreciation for Klahoose culture, history, and territory.

Oral History and Cultural Sharing

You are welcome to take photographs during your stay. We kindly ask that you first request permission from your Cultural Interpreters or Guides before sharing their image, songs, stories, or oral history presentations on social media or other public platforms.

If you have questions or would like to learn more about Klahoose history, culture, or sensitive historical topics, please feel free to speak with our resort team, who are always happy to support respectful dialogue and learning.

a few things to remember

WELCOME

WATER

Yes, you can drink from the tap. From that same freshwater source that we get our hydro power, a small creek beside the resort, we also get our drinking water, and it's the best! The water collected through another intake is filtered, treated daily, and tested regularly as required by the BC Health Authority standards and regulations.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES

Up to two complimentary drinks, from a selection of house wine and beer, are available during dinner and are included in the package. Klahoose Wilderness Resort also has a selection of premium wine and beer for purchase. You are welcome to bring your own additional alcoholic beverages to be consumed in your room or cabin.

SERVICE FEE

The Service Fee includes many activities and use of facilities at the resort including: WIFI, up to two complimentary alcoholic drinks (house wine or beer) with each dinner, in-room tea, coffee service, snacks, wood-fire sauna, campfire area, kayaks, stand-up paddle boards, hiking trails, activities such as cedar weaving, complimentary shared airport transfers between Powell River Airport and Lund (when required).

GRATUITY

The Service Fee includes a portion of gratuity for all Klahoose Wilderness Resort staff and our Toba Inlet bear guides. If you enjoyed your stay or wish to further acknowledge the staff and guides, please ask for an envelope and you may leave a gratuity with the on-site manager. A gratuity of \$50 per guest, per day, is recommended. These gratuities are shared among the resort's staff and guides.

WELCOME

OPPORTUNITY TO UNPLUG

There is no cell phone coverage at Klahoose Wilderness Resort.

A satellite Wi-Fi phone is located in the Main Lodge, intended primarily for emergency services and communication with our head office.

Our satellite Wi-Fi router is located in the Main Lodge, and the connection is usually strongest in that area. Please note that the signal becomes spotty as you move further away.

We kindly request that you avoid downloading or backing up large files, streaming video, or posting videos to social media, as this can slow the connection for everyone. You are welcome to share photos during your stay, keeping in mind the limited bandwidth.

GIFT SHOP

We are proud to offer a selection of Indigenous and locally crafted souvenirs and artisan items, available for purchase with a credit card.

While there is no store on-site at the resort, these unique pieces are a wonderful way to take a piece of the region home and support the local community and artists.

HOUSEKEEPING

Housekeeping is available on request during your stay. If you need fresh or extra towels or blankets, just let us know.

POWER & CHARGING

As an off-grid resort, we take pride in our self-sustaining micro-hydroelectric system. While we offer standard North American outlets in all guest rooms and cabins for charging, we ask that you help us conserve energy. We ask that guests do not use high-energy personal appliances such as portabel heaters or cooking devices.

BATH & COMFORT

Our guest soap bars are handmade locally with pure, organic ingredients, and other locally crafted soaps are available in the Main Lodge Gift Shop. Eco-friendly dispensers provide shampoo, conditioner, and body wash, and black face cloths are provided for makeup removal. Our signature bath robes are available for purchase, and every room includes a hairdryer.

Dock and swim towels, as well as cozy evening blankets, are available in the Main Lodge. Please kindly keep room towels and linens inside your room.

SMOKING, CANNABIS FIRE SAFETY

Klahoose Wilderness Resort is a non smoking facility to protect our environment and guest comfort. This includes tobacco, cannabis, and vaping.

Smoking or vaping is not permitted on boats or inside guest rooms, balconies, or common areas. Smoking is allowed only in designated outdoor areas on land. Please always use a receptacles, cigarette butts must never be left on the ground. Cannabis use must be discreet and confined to designated outdoor areas, with respect for our shared spaces.

Candles or any open flames are not permitted in guest rooms, cabins, or surrounding forest areas due to fire safety.

CONSERVATION

The Klahoose ancestors have carefully managed this legacy of natural resources for millennia, honouring and protecting the environment and all its inhabitants. Their commitment continues today, focusing on the preservation and conservation of our ocean, wilderness, marine and terrestrial life, as well as support for the local community.

A conservation fee of \$25 to \$35 per person per stay is included in your package. This fee supports our partnerships with the Commercial Bear Viewing Association (CBVA) and the North Island Marine Mammal Stewardship Association (NIMMSA), helping to develop industry standards, guide training, and fund ongoing research to protect bear and wildlife habitat.

Funds from this conservation license fee are distributed directly to CBVA and NIMMSA.

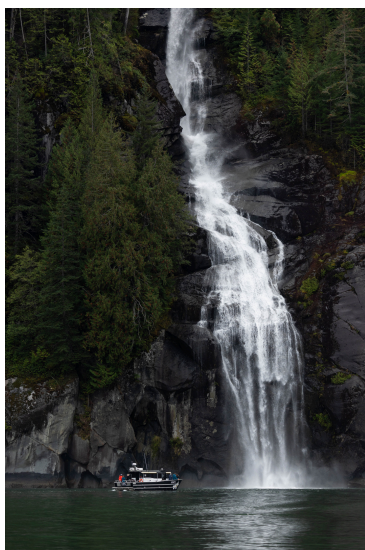

Desolation Sound

ACTIVITIES

Desolation Sound and Klahoose Wilderness Resort offer the perfect balance of relaxation and adventure. From our dock, enjoy water sports including ocean kayaks, sit-on-top kayaks, and stand-up paddle boards.

The ocean is warm enough for swimming, and our wood fire sauna is available on the dock.

Explore the rainforest along a nature trail to Foster Point (about 35 minutes round-trip) or take a more challenging hike up the mountain to a small grove of old-growth forest (1.5–2 hours round-trip). When permitted, enjoy an evening outdoor campfire.

At Klahoose Wilderness Resort, we take care of every detail so you can slow down, breathe in the cedar, taste the ocean, and be inspired by the natural beauty of our land and Indigenous culture. Here are just a few of the adventures included in our packages, along with more ways to explore.

included tours and experiences

ECO BOAT TOUR

WHALES & WATERFALL TOUR (Included from May to late August)

Our Toba Inlet boat tours are included for all guests from May through late August. Experience the stunning natural beauty of Toba Inlet, with towering mountain peaks, glacier-blue waters, and massive thundering waterfalls. Keep an eye out for marine life including humpback whales, orcas, dolphins, seals, and eagles. These tours are led by our knowledgeable Klahoose guides.

The tour is scheduled for day 2 of your stay and lasts approximately 4-5 hours.

Included in the Eco-Adventure Tour:

- Lunch, drinks, and snacks
- Wildlife viewing
- Onboard Indigenous guide
- Covered and heated boats
- Onboard washrooms on all boats
- Reusable water bottles

What to bring: Dress warmly, especially if you plan to spend time on the outdoor deck. Enclosed footwear, a camera, and binoculars are recommended.

CULTURAL BATHING EXPERIENCE

ʼtonom & ʔaʔuk^{wə}m Cultural Bathing Experience

(T'oh nohm / Homfray Creek or Ah pooh kwom / Forbes Bay)

Scheduled Day 3 | May to mid August on our Discover Klahoose stays

Your journey begins with a scenic boat ride through the heart of Klahoose ancestral waters to a place of deep cultural and natural significance. Guided by our Klahoose team, you will visit either ʼtonom (T'oh nohm / Homfray Creek) or ʔaʔuk^{wə}m (Ah pooh kwom / Forbes Bay), depending on conditions.

Both locations are centred around freshwater creeks flowing through the forest, offering a quiet place to gather, reflect, and share stories.

Guests are invited to take part in a cultural bathing experience, rooted in practices of spiritual and physical cleansing. Bathing may take place in the freshwater creek or in the ocean shoreline, each offering a different connection to the land and water. You may also choose to simply enjoy the stillness of these places.

For the return, you may travel back by boat or choose a self-guided sea kayaking journey along the shoreline back to the lodge.

What to bring: Dress in layers. For river or ocean bathing, bring a bathing suit, towel, and water shoes. For kayaking, bring active clothing, a hat, and eco friendly sunscreen.

Site Details: This is a rustic nature experience. Landings may be on a rocky shoreline or small dock, with walking on uneven terrain. Location is selected based on conditions. Please speak with us in advance regarding accessibility or mobility considerations.

GRIZZLY BEAR VIEWING

GRIZZLY BEAR VIEWING TOURS (Two Tours Included, Late August–October)

These tours travel by boat through yəkʷamən (Toba Inlet), past waterfalls and stunning landscapes, before arriving at our dock in Toba Inlet. From there, we board a bus to our raised wooden viewing platforms to watch the grizzly bears in their natural habitat. Tours are scheduled for day 2 and 3 of your package and last approximately 6–7 hours, with around 3 hours spent observing the bears.

Included in the Grizzly Bear Viewing Tours:

- Lunch, drinks, and snacks
- Boat transfer from the resort to our Toba Inlet dock (1 hour) with wildlife viewing
- Mini-bus transfer from dock to viewing platforms
- Platform viewing from raised and covered wooden platforms (about 3 hours)
- Indigenous guide trained with the Commercial Bear Viewing Association of BC
- Covered and heated boats
- Onboard washrooms on all boats and outhouse at Toba Inlet dock (please note: no washrooms at the viewing towers)
- Reusable water bottles

What to bring: Extra clothing, enclosed footwear (mandatory), camera, binoculars, and a sense of adventure. Monopods are allowed, but please do not bring tripods, perfume, or food.

Please remember, we are observing wildlife in their natural habitat and cannot guarantee specific sightings.





OTHER ACTIVITIES TO ENJOY

INDIGENOUS ACTIVITIES

Guided Indigenous storytelling, songs, cedar weaving, and cultural experiences are included during your stay, with activities offered each evening.

CEDAR BRUSHING OFF CEREMONY

A traditional cedar brushing off ceremony offers a moment of grounding and renewal, using cedar boughs to symbolically cleanse and welcome you to the land.

- Sea kayaking with included equipment for self guided exploration
- Stand up paddleboarding from the dock
- Ocean swimming from our floating dock, with swim ladder access
- Wood fired cedar sauna on the dock
- Rainforest walks, guided or self guided, including an easy scenic trail and a more challenging hike
- Behind the scenes look at our off grid hydro power system
- Campfires, stargazing, and seasonal bioluminescence
- Yoga mats available for use on the dock or lodge deck
- Time to relax, unplug, and take in the surrounding wilderness

FISHING

FISHING CHARTERS

Enhance your stay at Klahoose Wilderness Resort with thrilling ocean fishing adventure, offered as optional add-ons. Our tours are guided by experienced, local fishing professionals who bring their expertise and passion for the sport. Whether you're a first-timer or a seasoned angler, our guides will ensure a memorable and enjoyable time on the water.

While fishing can be booked while at the lodge, subject to availability. We do recommend adding fishing to your stay in advance. Have Questions? Reach out to us for more Information.

Embark on a saltwater fishing adventure with local experts who operate top-of-the-line Grady-White vessels. These professionally guided charters include all necessary equipment, safety gear, and fish cleaning services.

Requirements: A Fishing License is required.

Capacity: Each boat accommodates 3-4 guests (2 active fishers).

Fishing can be booked at the lodge, subject to availability, though we recommend reserving in advance.

HELI TOURS

GLACIER HELI TOUR

Experience a helicopter tour over the wild Coast Mountain Glaciers. Fly above the most remote inlets of BC and access the Coast Mountain range in an amazing way.

Tour Duration: One Hour or Two Hour with 30-minute mountain stop

HELI-GLACIER WALK

Take in the remote peaks and stunning glaciers of BC's Coastal Ranges by air and by foot. The short glacier traverse to a glaciated mountain top can only be described using superlatives. Ropes, crampons, ice axes, and certified mountain guides are included so you can focus on the awe-inspiring views provided by some of the last truly remote wilderness on the planet. Tour Duration: 4-5 hours

HELI-HIKING

Helicopter to the top of the mountains that surround the Resort and hike some of the most remote areas of the BC Coast with a certified alpine guide. Tour Duration: Half Day from 4-5 hours or Full Day from 7-8 hours from easy to advanced hiking

HELI-PADDLE ON A GLACIER LAKE

This is a once-in-a-lifetime experience. Fly to the jaw-dropping peaks surrounding the Resort and either kayak or stand-up paddle on some of the oldest glaciers in BC. The glacier lake adventure is guided by a certified Paddle Canada Guide. Tour Duration: Half Day Tour from 4-5 hours

HELI FLY-FISHING

Spend the day with a professional fishing guide in the Coast Mountain rivers surrounding the resort. With a helicopter, your pilot, and guide will find the perfect private spot to cast your line. This day is perfect for all levels of anglers and is run by professional guides. Fishing gear and lunch are included. BC Fishing license not included. Half Day or Full Day

Depending on your itinerary, you may have an extra day at leisure or consider adding optional activities. These activities should be booked in advance. Contact us for rates, availability, and information on fishing and heli-tours.



packing suggestions & weather

WHAT TO BRING

Dress in layers and keep it casual. Weather is usually warm from May to October, but can be cooler on the water. The ocean is warm enough for swimming.

Suggested items:

- Comfortable pants and shorts
- Light jacket or rain jacket, sweater or fleece
- Closed-toed shoes for walking and mandatory on boats
- Hiking boots if you plan on the longer, steep rainforest self guided hike
- Bathing suit and water shoes (for river or ocean dips, sauna)
- Sunglasses, sunhat or warm hat
- Binoculars
- Bug repellent, eco-friendly sunscreen, lip balm
- Personal toiletries and medication
- Daypack and camera (extra memory cards recommended)
- Devices and chargers (Wi-Fi and satellite phone available, no cell coverage)

There is no store or ATM on-site. Bring cash for gratuities if desired. Credit cards are accepted for gratuities, the gift shop, alcohol, and optional tours. Please bring all personal items needed for your stay.

May-June: Highs 16-22°C (61-72°F), lows 8-13°C (46-55°F)

July-August: Highs 20-27°C (68-81°F), lows 12-16°C (54-61°F)

September-October: Highs 17-22°C (63-72°F), lows 9-13°C (48-55°F)

Lund (Klah ah men) is a small, picturesque community located at the north end of BC's Sunshine Coast, on the traditional and unceded territory of the Tla'amin, Klahoose, and Homalco First Nations. It's known as the "End of the Road" due to its location at Mile 0 of Highway 101, which is part of one of the longest highway networks in the world.

Discover charming accommodations, dine in welcoming eateries, shop at artisan boutiques, rent a kayak or book a boat or kayak tour, and enjoy Lund's carefree atmosphere. Lund is truly a gateway to adventure—from the harbour, can venture to nearby Savary Island, the Copeland Islands, Desolation Sound, and even Sarah Point, which is where the 180-kilometre Sunshine Coast Trail begins.

The Sunshine Coast is located in southwest British Columbia, Canada. It stretches 180km (110m) along the Salish Sea from Howe Sound to Desolation Sound. It lies just northwest of Vancouver, but although it's part of BC's mainland, the Sunshine Coast can only be accessed by plane, ferry, or private boat. With no bridge access, the Sunshine Coast enjoys less traffic and fewer crowds.
